
On April 11th A.R.E.S. students were treated to an afternoon of excitement. They were told in advance to bring recycling supplies for a special activity, but they had no idea 315 baby chicks were waiting outside to find their owners. We had some energetic PAC parents fill plastic eggs with tiny baby chicks and hide them all over the school grounds for this schoolwide project. No, the chicks weren't real, but these little creatures became the responsibility of each student for four days. We knew they would experience a sense of ownership, show great care and empathy, and ensure their little chickens were well cared for.

We began the afternoon with our first assembly in two-years, which the intermediate students attended. (We wanted to start small. Many of our primary children will need an opportunity for practice, since few of them have attended an assembly). We showed the older students a slideshow, reminding them of the important role they would play with the younger students, and then the Spring Chicken Hunt began. After picking up their younger buddies, the whole school ventured outside to search for their baby chicks.

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Just as we knew they would, the older students supported their younger partners to find their eggs. Back into the school they went for an afternoon of creativity. Thanks to all of the ARES families, our kids were well-prepared with such a variety of recycling, craft supplies, and natural items found outside. We were level of amazed at the engagement throughout the school. From kindergarten through to grade seven, students were focused homes for on constructing their responsibilities.

For the remainder of the week, the students worked hard to make their pets feel safe and loved. This activity incorporated all four of the Circle of Courage values (Belonging, Generosity, Independence, and Mastery). However, learning to give, show some care, support others, and be responsible for something other than oneself, most definitely triggered the GENEROSITY domain in so many of our students. They gave very generously to their chicks (and their buddies) for four days before taking their pets home.

Our A.R.E.S. Breakfast Program

Our ARES students are very fortunate to have a daily Breakfast Program, which is organized by our PAC parents. Between 8:15 – 8:45, all students have the option to visit the gym, where they choose from a selection of heathy food to start their day. We have sixteen volunteers who rotate throughout the week to provide a mixed menu of pancakes, hot and cold cereal, toast, scrambled eggs, smoothies, parfaits, yogurt tubes, muffins and the all-time favorite —Grilled Cheese! In addition to this selection, there is always an option of fresh fruit and milk to choose from.

Thanks to Pealow's Your Independent Grocer, this program is funded by community support. When you purchase your groceries and donate to the PC Charity Grant, all proceeds remain in our community for local programs, such as our ARES breakfasts. We are also fortunate to have weekly donations of eggs from Sunshine Valley Farms and Crimson Hackles, twenty loaves of bread from Golden Flour Bakery, and two to three crates of milk from Kootenay Meadows.

The Parent Advisory Committee (PAC) is a vital part of our school. They organize our hot lunches, popcorn sales, special events, breakfast program and are quick to step in when we need support with schoolwide activities. The new playground, that will arrive in August and require set up, is the result of this group's dedication to our school.






If your child turns 5 by December 31, 2022, he or she can start school this September. Preregistration is required so please visit the ARES office.

The Circle of Courage and the Importance of Belonging

A sense of belonging is a crucial need of all people. When youth feel connected and attached, this core strength can protect them from many social challenges. We are working hard to create a safe environment at ARES in which our students feel supported and connected.

Students need healthy attachment and belonging in order to self-regulate, join in with others, develop empathy, accept diversity and be respectful to themselves and those around them. In fact, belonging is so important that unless children feel it, their ability to engage in learning activities and positive behaviour can be challenging.

Our long-term vision at ARES is to support the development of RESILIENT children who can thrive in any community. We know that resilience is significantly enhanced when a child feels cared for, protected from threat, encouraged to take responsible risks during the learning process and recognized as an equal within our school. For this reason, creating a sense of belonging for our students, is our greatest priority.


#### School Wide Activity







In order to create a sense of belonging for our staff and students, we try to incorporate activities that everyone participates in. We asked the question, "If you were an animal, what would you be?" The staff completed the activity first. The students loved to read our responses on the entrance bulletin board and find answers to the "mystery question," which we asked during the announcements each morning. Later, we had students work with buddy classes to complete their own response to the same question. We took ALL of their work and found commonalities. For example, there were 32 staff and/or students who would be cats if they were an animal, so we displayed all of the cats together. We also highlighted uniqueness. There were some very creative and individualized responses, such as a Buffalo. We created daily questions and students searched for the answers by looking at the animals displayed all around our school. This activity connected everyone. Regardless of our age or artistic ability, we all completed the same task and learned a lot about one another.
