

Students were challenged to guess which portrait belonged to who, and for several weeks, the main entrance was occupied by students determined to identify the mystery pictures and enter their guesses in the daily draw.

Of course, this staff activity had a purpose and was the beginning of a much larger event. Although most of us do not view ourselves as artists, we wanted to emphasize the importance of courage, taking risks, and effort in learning, regardless of ability. On May 10th, in a large schoolwide activity, it was our hope that students would participate with the same type of determination.





Ms. Sonntag's Grade 7's

Over the past year, the students have learned about Colonialism and Reconciliation. During a visit to the Creston Museum in February, Ms. Sonntag's class had a chance to explore how these concepts manifest themselves in the context of a community museum.

Now, the students are taking that learning even further. They have been invited to select exhibits at the Museum, work with Ktunaxa Elders and knowledge-keepers to identify ways in which the exhibits can better reflect the Ktunaxa perspective, alongside settler perspectives, and prepare presentations to illustrate their recommendations.

What started as a simple program to help students understand two different perspectives of land use in the Creston Valley (traditional Ktunaxa uses and settler-economic uses) has evolved into a large-scale project. As the Museum strives to decolonize its exhibits, the students are now incorporating their learning of these perspectives directly into the museum displays. Over the summer of 2022, take a look at the museum exhibits as they begin to transform as a result of our student recommendations.



Strengths help people cope with life's challenges, which is an essential component of resilience. Rather than worrying about limitations and deficits, the goal is to create experiences that lead to positive outcomes in our students. The long-term result are adults who can better cope with life's challenges. Our long-term vision at ARES is to support the development of RESILIENT children who can thrive in any community.

The Learning Fair



The hallways of A.R.E.S. were filled with families on April 27th and 28th for our first annual Learning Fair. Many parents have not been inside our building due to COVID restrictions, so this event was a perfect chance for parents to share in the celebration of their children's success. The event was intended as an opportunity for A.R.E.S. students to have a voice in communicating their learning to parents. What are they proud of? What's going well? What engages them at school? Where do they spend their day? It was a chance to see very authentic evidence of student learning.

Students were invited to bring their parents on either of the two early-dismissal days to participate in a special challenge. They received a Punch Card at the door, and then toured their families to each of the destinations listed on the card. Once families completed the visits to each location, they entered the card in a draw for a student from each class to win a Dairy Queen lunch with Mr. Adams and Mrs. Christenson.

In the library, Mrs. Walker, our Teacher–Librarian, had many stations set up so that students could demonstrate their skills with technology, such as Bloxels, M–Bots, Bee Bots, Osmos, Code.org, Kodable, and Makey Makey/Scratch. In the gym, aside from viewing some large samples of student learning, PAC offered coffee and snacks for parents to enjoy throughout the tour. Visitors also viewed the plans for our NEW PLAYGROUND, which will be installed at the beginning of August. In our newly renovated Fine Arts space, Mrs. Vandenberghe had some student work displayed, a quick activity for families to complete, and SHREK the Musical Jr. tickets were sold by cast members who were dressed in costume. In our Aboriginal Education Classroom, Josie Fullarton shared some of the work she does, and students taught their families a Ktunaxa greeting. Finally, in each child's classroom, students had work ready to share. What a perfect way to reconnect with such an important component of our school – the ARES Families!
