


On Thursday, November 10th, ARES students and parents gathered in the gym for a special assembly in honour of Remembrance Day. We were impressed with the respect our students demonstrated as they quietly entered and sat through a series of special performances, emceed by Grade 7 students, Lane Maddess and Tyler Vigna. Following some important words from veteran, Mr. Ian Currie, Mrs. Doeleman's Grade 3/4 & Ms. Smith's Grade 2/3 classes performed a song called "Sing for Peace."

Mr. Percival's Grade 6 class prepared a creative reading of the famous poem, "In Flanders Fields," written by a young Canadian soldier in 1915. John McCrae was a doctor and teacher, who served in both the South African War and the First World War. He was inspired and deeply moved by the bright red poppies growing in the battle fields after the soldiers had stopped fighting. Since he wrote the poem, the red poppy has come to symbolize remembrance, hope for a peaceful future, and recognizes the soldiers who fought and died in war.

We were also treated to our ARES Performing Arts Club, directed by Mrs. Hamm, singing, "Let it Be," by the Beatles.

To end the assembly, each class made a wreath, which they laid at the front of the gym before exiting.

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




