

Did you know that problem-solving is an important part of BC's K-9 curriculum? Each of our students engage in math problem-solving, regardless of age. They are encouraged to use multiple strategies to apply their understanding of the various concepts they are taught


## **READ-A-THON**

The Province of BC has established January 24 – 31 as Family Literacy Week. This annual campaign is intended to recognize and promote the importance of family literacy. Reading as a family can look like many things: Learning together through everyday interactions such as reading, cooking, talking, singing, and playing together as a family.

The Great Big Buddy Read, organized by the Columbia Basin Alliance for Literacy (CBAL) is part of this experience, and especially supports students who do not have the opportunity to share in literacy activities with a family.

At ARES, our Buddy pairs joined together on January 26th, and the older students read to the younger students. Some of the younger students also practiced their own reading with their big buddies or they talked together about the books they were viewing.

- Read signs as you drive
- Write packing lists if you are going out on a holiday or adventure
- Talk often about things you see as you explore the world together
- Follow recipes as you cook together
