As Chensi and Anden move on to KRSS, we are grateful for their contribution to our school community.

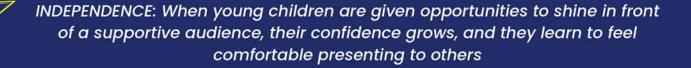

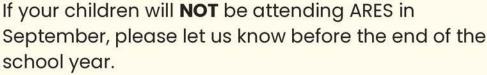

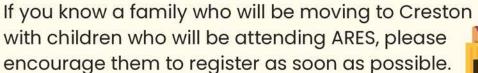
