

On October 15th and 16th, during Early Dismissal Days, we welcomed families into ARES to share in student learning. Thanks for the amazing attendance!




Throughout the school year, parents and guardians will receive at least **five** updates on student progress:

Parent Primary Literacy Workshop

Families of Kindergarten to Grade 3 students are invited to join Mrs. Cote and Mrs. Vandenberghe for a fun and engaging session on creating UFLI Word Work Mats — a powerful tool grounded in the Science of Reading.

Developed by the University of Florida Literacy Institute, the UFLI program helps students build strong reading foundations through interactive, hands-on learning.

During this session, parents will:

- Learn how to use word work mats to build and read words through a word chain activity
- Create their own take-home mats with letter tiles
- See demonstrations on using the mats for practicing letters, reading, spelling, and word building

This one-hour session will take place on **Monday, November 3rd, from 3:30 – 4:30 PM** in the ARES Library


