**Light Up the Town** 











# Fry Bread, Leadership, and Generosity at ARES



















This month, our students took part in a special learning experience connected to Indigenous culture and our ongoing Circle of Courage work.

Our Aboriginal Support Worker, Josie Fullarton, and Aboriginal Success Teacher, Danielle Sonntag, guided two classes in learning how to make fry bread, a well-known Indigenous food with deep roots in history and community.

Fry bread is found in many Indigenous nations, including the Ktunaxa. Although it began during a difficult period when Indigenous peoples were displaced and given limited rations, it has since become a meaningful symbol of resilience, cultural strength, and coming together. Today, it is often shared at gatherings, celebrations, and community events, reminding us of the importance of generosity and caring for one another.

After learning the process, themselves, Mrs. Hamm's Grade 6/7 class demonstrated leadership. Once they mastered the recipe, they supported Mrs. Vigna's Grade 4 class in making another large batch by teaching the younger students. Together, the two classes made enough fry bread for every student in the school, ensuring everyone received a piece before they enjoyed any themselves.

This experience supported the Circle of Courage value of Generosity, showing that caring for the community is central to learning. It also reflects an important Ktunaxa teaching, that we look after each other by giving to others before taking for ourselves.

# Connecting with the Greater Creston Community







This month, ARES students had more opportunities to connect with the wider Creston community. Mrs. Page's class walked to Kootenay River Secondary School to watch Chemistry 11 demonstrations, with some students even getting the chance to participate. It was a great way for the grade 3/4 class to see older students in action in another school setting.

In Mr. Blick's class, the grade 4/5 students tried curling at the Creston & District Community Complex, guided by volunteer coaches. Many were experiencing the sport for the first time and were fully engaged as they learned new skills from patient and skilled adults.

Mrs. Vandenberghe's class returned to Crestview Village, spending time with senior residents making Christmas ornaments. They also sang their concert song for the residents, to add some holiday cheer.

These experiences connect directly to the Circle of Courage, highlighting the importance of adults as role models and guides. Students learn not only through practice and participation, but also by observing and engaging with adults who encourage, support, and inspire them. Whether it's a volunteer coach, a teacher, or a senior resident, these meaningful connections help students grow, feel a sense of belonging, and understand the value of contributing to their community.
