Throughout the month, students followed weekly, video updates, created by Mrs. Walker, our Teacher Librarian. Her videos featured familiar scenes from animated movies that helped bring the Circle of Courage to life, showing students what belonging, mastery, independence, and generosity look like in action.

Students aimed to read at least 20 minutes each night, carefully tracking their minutes, as every minute read contributed to a larger team effort. Together, those minutes helped reveal the Courage Path on our bulletin board and reinforced the importance of reading, teamwork, and community.

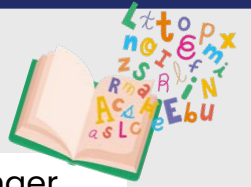


Literacy is Shared Writing Activities

Family Literacy Week



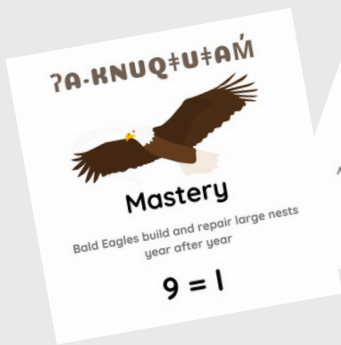
As part of Family Literacy Week, older students partnered with their younger buddies to take part in the Reader Games Scavenger Hunt. Working together, students searched throughout the school to crack a secret code and reveal a hidden message.

Along the way, students explored how each of our six Community Courage Team animals – Grizzly Bear (k̄aw̄a), Buffalo (kamqūukū ʔiyamu), Bald Eagle (ʔa-knuq̄uʔam̄), Deer (cupqa), Moose (niçnapku), and Coyote (skinkuç) – demonstrates the four domains of the Circle of Courage in the natural world. Through reading animal facts, students learned concrete examples of belonging, mastery, independence, and generosity in action.

Students who cracked the code and revealed the message earned extra Courage Points for their Community Courage Teams.

On January 30th, all students will gather in an assembly to see which team read the most minutes and celebrate their achievements.

Return of the Kokanee Salmon Program



This year, our school is participating in the Return of the Kokanee Salmon program in partnership with the Creston Valley Rod & Gun Club. Through this hands-on conservation project, students are learning about the Kokanee salmon life cycle by caring for salmon eggs in a classroom aquarium and observing each stage of development as they hatch into alevins and grow into fry. The program connects science learning with local environmental stewardship and helps students understand the importance of healthy waterways in our region.

Mr. Blick's Grade 4/5 class and Mrs. Page's Grade 3/4 class are gaining a deeper appreciation for the patience, responsibility, and care involved in protecting local species





Literacy is Everyday Conversations

Talking together about what you see, do, and think throughout the day, and encouraging children to ask questions, share ideas, and explain their thinking.

Snapchat this? Instagram that! Children today are growing up in a digital world and developing their online identities earlier than ever before. To help support them in this space, our school will be hosting a **Digital Media Education Workshop** focused on building strong digital citizenship skills.

On February 17 and 18, our three Grade 6/7 classes will participate in age-appropriate presentations that explore topics such as digital footprints, online decision-making, cyberbullying, privacy, anonymity, and the impact of video games and screen use. The sessions are designed to help students think critically about their online and offline choices and to reinforce that their digital actions reflect who they are.

In addition, an evening parent session will be offered for all ARES parents who are interested in learning more about supporting children in today's digital world. You do not need to have a child in Grade 6 or 7 to attend. This session will provide practical guidance, discussion, and tools to help families navigate social media, gaming, and online safety together.

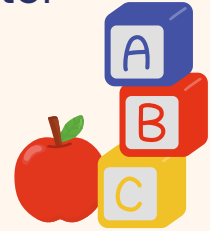

 or alphabet games, that involve reading or spelling.

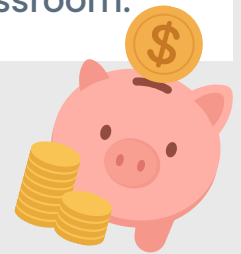


Money Math

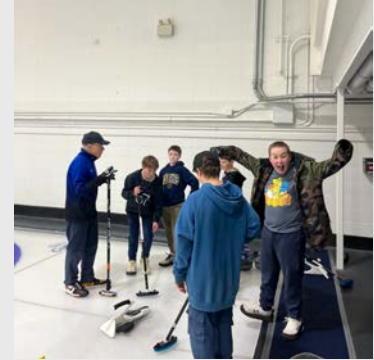

Mrs. Miller's Kindergarten class recently spent a morning outside participating in a Winter Wonder program focused on winter ecology. Although there was no snow, students were engaged as they used their senses to observe the natural environment and learn how plants and animals are affected by seasonal changes. They compared different living things, shared their observations with classmates, and gained a better understanding of why winter is important to our local ecosystem.
